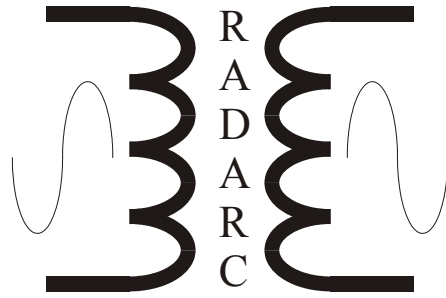


# Reading and District Amateur Radio Club

## Rules for Sale of Equipment (except 'Junk Sale')

June 2005



1. These rules are adopted by the current committee and may be varied at any time by the committee. They do not form part of the constitution of RADARC.
2. These rules apply to the sale of equipment on behalf of members, ex-members, non-members and those seeking the assistance of the club in disposing of equipment left by deceased relatives.
3. Equipment may be sold by advertising on the club web pages, in the newsletter and in emails to the current membership, and also via RADARC club tables at amateur radio rallies. Small remnants may be sold at the annual junk sale.
4. Equipment sold on behalf of members and non-members in normal good health attracts a commission of 10%, (except that the committee may waive this in particular cases).
5. Equipment sold on behalf of those seeking the assistance of the club in disposing of equipment left by deceased relatives does not attract any commission. Where the seller wishes that the proceeds go to a charity this must be made clear, and no commission is expected, including cases where the amateur requests the sale.

Items of high value (above £100) must be pointed out to the seller, and backed by evidence such as the RSGB Rig Guide as to its value. Agreement must be reached before sale as to how a price is set or negotiated. Sellers should be advised that E-bay may fetch higher prices than RADARC can.

Nondescript items such as commercial and military surplus devices, collections of components etc. and small items will be sold for whatever price may be reached (typically less than £10), including auction at the club junk sale.

6. Occasionally a nondescript, dirty or damaged item may turn out to have an antique or rarity value. The club will attempt to manage such a situation appropriately, but no liability is accepted for such items undersold.
7. In some cases significant amounts of equipment have been offered for sale by the club for club funds, by amateurs and relatives. In such cases, the member/committee member in contact must be quite clear about this. A letter of appreciation, saying how much was realised, should be sent after the sale.
